LEADER'S NOTES

These notes are here as guidelines or commentary notes to help the leader.

Throughout history, the perspective of justice differs between nations and cultures. The same way a Chinese person loves eating pork, and a Jewish person thinks that it is wrong is an example of how different cultures might view justice differently.

When we start thinking about what is right and wrong, we need to ask God – "What is right in your eyes?" "How can we live with your laws written on our hearts?"

Because we have been saved by Jesus, we are no longer afraid of judgement, because we are recipients of the mercy and grace of God. But because we have been saved, God also wants us to be actively defending those who are marginalised in society. We should always be demonstrating the right life of Christ, and bringing his mercy and love to all those around us.
